The Lincoln Highway was the first transcontinental road for automobiles in the USA, dedicated in 1913. The road traverses over 3,000 miles from San Francisco to New York City with lots of interesting and historic destinations along the way. This famous highway passes right through the heart of historic Gettysburg on it's way to our famous neighbor to the east, Lancaster, PA.

Over the next few days we will explore the highlights of this historic highway. We will start the day exploring how a small farming town called Gettysburg became a place recognized by name all over the world. We will head off to Gettysburg National Park Visitor Center for a detailed orientation from the film, cyclorama presentation and museum.


After a casual lunch it will be time to embark on a tour of the Gettysburg Battlefield with a Licensed Guide including a walking tour of the Soldiers National Cemetery where our 16th President, Abraham Lincoln recited the Gettysburg Address.

After the tour it will be time for some downtime for shopping on your own or relaxing back at the hotel before dinner. Dinner this evening will include a period impersonator, perhaps President Lincoln will make his return to town for you.

After dinner we will rest up so we're ready to hit the pavement down the Lincoln Highway.

The next morning, a voyage of an hour or so will take us into the heart of Amish Country in Lancaster, PA. Here you will learn about the fascinating culture through the Experience Theater, One Room School House, Farmlands Tour and of course a traditional Pennsylvania Dutch family style lunch. As we travel back towards Gettysburg, we'll make a timely stop at the The National Watch & Clock Museum to see the largest collection of time pieces in North America.

As the clock strikes five we will load up for a short drive to dinner at John Wright Restaurant with a view of the Susquehanna River a short distance from where the Confederate Army burned one of the worlds longest covered bridges in June of 1863. After dinner it's back to the comfort of our Gettysburg hotel to reflect on the full day you've had. The next morning before going home there will be time for a tour through one of the downtown historic homes whose residents were witness to some of the most significant events of our Nation.
